Down with the old Chacko's, up with the new

For those of you who do not already know, the parking lot next to Chacko's Bowling Lanes on 169 South Main Street, will soon be closing.

For quite some time students, faculty and shoppers have been parking next to the bowling lanes.

That will soon change as Chacko's Bowling Lanes will be torn down and the new Corporate Call Center will be constructed.

The Corporate Call Center, which will be a phone service for catalog orders, will take up the

parking lot, along with the space vacated by Chacko's.

Paul O'Hop, Vice President of Business Affairs said, "The sidewalk will still remain for students to travel from Wilkes University to Main Street."

However, the sidewalk will be about the only thing spared by this new construction.

The last day for business at Chacko's Bowling Lanes will be on February 14.

"The city owns the property but they allowed us to stay until the 21st of February," said Danny Chacko, acting manager at the bowling lanes.

"I've been letting people know that there won't be any

"Some people have taken advantage of me telling them this ahead of time," he said, "I keep telling them when they ask this lot will be

closed soon."

There is no doubt that Chacko's is losing plenty of business, two and half months worth.

"Everybody is looking forward to the new center though," he said.

The new Chacko's Family Bowling Center, which will be located on 195 North Wilkes-Barre Boulevard, began construction in November.

The new bowling center will have it's grand opening sometime in May. It will be complete with forty new synthetic bowling lanes, all new equipment, a lounge and a bar.

Some say they are not nterested. Others give the xcuse that they just don't have the time to join.

Their minds are sure to hange when they discover that an organization exists here which has the potential link them to mployment opportunities in the business world.

S.I.F.E., or Students In Free Enterprise, was founded in the late 1970's by business people who's goal was to inform students about the free enterprise system.

The S.I.F.E. program began with only 50 chapters but now has over 1,000 chapters around the world.

But what exactly is the purpose of S.I.F.E.? The goal of the organization is to provide students with the best business opportunities to make a difference and to develop leadership, teamwork and communication skills through learning, practicing and teaching the principles of free enterprise.

The S.I.F.E. chapter at Wilkes began last semester when Dr. Jeff Alves introduced the program to his entrepreneurial class. Many students were interested in

the benefits of the program so the club was organized.

There are currently 11 members in the S.I.F.E. chapter at Wilkes.

"Students in all majors are welcomed and encouraged to join," said C.J. Copley, senior and president of the organization at Wilkes.

What exactly do you have to do as a S.I.F.E. member? The group works together to develop projects throughout the year. S.I.F.E. is currently working on five projects, including developing its own Home Page, putting together a program called "The Nuts and Bolts of How To Start Your Own Business," helping to market Rumours, creating a boardgame called Wilkesopoly and putting

together entrepreneurial forums that will allow business owners to explain to Wilkes students how they began their careers.

At the end of March, all of the S.I.F.E. chapters participate in a regional and international competition held in Parsippany, New

The competition requires individual campus teams to give a 20 minute demonstration to explain the projects they have developed throughout the year to other student members.

A recruiting fair takes place following the competition. Many times, CEO's and Business Executives hire S.I.F.E. members on the spot.

Alves thinks that there are many benefits of having a S.I.F.E. program at Wilkes. "Students involved with S.I.F.E. at two year colleges are now looking to continue their education's at schools that offer the S.I.F.E. program. This will help Wilkes in its recruiting process," Alves said.

Another benefit of being a S.I.F.E. member is that the students have the opportunity to be a part of the "Certified S.I.F.E. Student Program."

The requirements include the completion of a minimum of 50 hours of S.I.F.E. experience and a recommendation by an advisor.

He has called the PennDot hotline and the meteorologists at the Channel 16 weather station to check on the snow fall.

He finds out how much snow is expected, how long the snow is planned to continue and what the driving conditions are going to be like.

He also checks the internet for up-to-date weather maps of the storm system causing the snow, sleet or rain.

Once Davis gets all the necessary information, he makes a call to Paul Adams, Dean of Student Affairs and University College at Wilkes University.

Adams has the authority to cancel classes. After Davis gives Adams all of the information he has acquired, they discuss their options.

Adams then contacts Sister Mary Glennon at College Misericordia and Dean Shergalia at King's College to discuss the weather situation. At this point, they make their decision.

Wilkes University, King's College and College Misericordia are in their first year of cooperative scheduling.

This means that any cancellation, due to snow or any other reason must be a

unanimous decision by all three schools.

The thought process behind this cooperative education is for all three schools to have the same academic calendar.

This policy allows students from each school to cross-register between schools without having scheduling conflicts.

After Adams, Glennon and Shergalia discuss their options over the phone a decision is made, Adams then informs Mark Davis of their decision.

Davis then begins to make a series of phone calls. Davis describes himself as the "keeper of codes," because a special code must

be given out to authenticate his call

Davis contacts all local TV stations and 35 radio stations, which reach from Bloomsburg to Scranton, to inform them of the cancellation.

According to Davis, "Weather is so inexact and we make the best decision we can. We know we're not always right."

He urges students to read through the inclement weather policy, in the student handbook, for more information about weather and attendance.

caused by the HIV virus, which is spread in three ways. These ways are having vaginal, anal or oral sex, sharing needles and through mother's infecting their babies in the womb, at birth or during breast feeding. HIV may be present in a person's blood, semen or vaginal fluid.

When you engage in risky behavior, it definitely puts you at risk, but behavior such as not having sex, having sex with a faithful, uninfected partner and not shooting drugs are just a few ways to stay safe.

A commonly asked question is where and when should I get tested for HIV? Planned Parenthood in Wilkes-Barre offers Peace of Mind Testing. This is for anyone who just wants to be on the safe side. There is a window period of six months from the last time of engaging in sexual activity

that one can be infected with an STD.

The cost is \$25 and each test is strictly confidential. Also, the State Health Department offers STD testing every Tuesday and HIV testing on the first Friday of every month from 1-5 p.m., on 379 South Main Street.

There are currently 32 STDs. HPV is a group of viruses that infect the skin. This STD is on the rise and is currently incurable.

"The virus causes warts or it can be inactive in the skin cells," said Susan Smith, Department of Education Services, Planned Parenthood, Wilkes-Barre.

It can also be transmitted without any signs or symptoms. There is NO test for this disease and it can cause cancer. Cancer could appear in any of the infected areas such as the penis, rectum,

vagina and the vulva especially the cervix.

There are some behaviors which make you more likely to contract HPV. One such behavior is smoking because it increases the aggressiveness of the virus. Another is engaging in sexual intercourse before age 20. At this time, cervical cells are immature and vulnerable to the virus. Last but not least, more than one sexual partner in your lifetime increases the liklihood of obtaining an STD. The only way to prevent this infection is through abstinence.

It is obvious that abstinence is the only sure way to be safe, but for the most people it is not what they choose. Valentine's Day is right around the corner and it is important to make a right choice for "you" in a particular situation. Being safe is the

key. Would you rather have five minutes of pleasure or a lifetime of suffering?

How to use a condom:

- Use a new condom every time you have sex.
- · Handle condom gently.
- Make sure the rolled up ring is on the outside.
- Squeeze tip gently so no air is trapped inside.
- Hold tip while you unroll condom.
- After intercourse, hold condom in place and move completely away before removal.

Tips for success:

- •Never let a condom touch oil in any form. Use water based lubricants.
- Keep unused condoms in their packs in a cool dry place; not a wallet.

Important: If used properly, latex condoms will help reduce the risk of transmission of the HIV infection and many other STDs.

unprotected sex at any time, ASHA recommends that both be tested for STDs in a physician office or clinic. The partners should also use condoms correctly every time they have sex to help protect against transmitting an infection.

Alexander emphasized that abstaining from sex is the only completely safe choice.

"For those who are having sex, unless both partners are 100 percent certain that they are free of infection, condoms are essential," said Alexander.

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention, five of the 10 most frequently reported infectious diseases in the US-chlamydia, gonorrhea, AIDS, syphilis and hepatitis B- are STDs. It is estimated that there are 12 million new STD cases in the US annually, with

two-thirds occurring in people under 25 and one-fourth in teenagers.

The CDC recommends condom use for STD protection based on studies conducted among couples in

which one partner was infected with HIV/ AIDS. By

condoms consistently and correctly, 98-100 percent of the couples avoided transmitting HIV to the uninfected partner.

Condoms are also considered to be highly effective in protecting against chlamydia, gonorrhea,

syphilis and other STDs that are passed via bodily fluids. Condoms are less reliable in preventing transmission of genital herpes and genital human papillomavirus (HPV). HPV's are STDs that

> transmitted by skin-toskin contact, because the site of infection may lie outside the condom. However,

people with herpes or HPV should use condoms to protect against other STDs.

Among types of condoms, the male latex condom is considered the most effective in preventing STDs. A female condom, which is made of plastic, also is considered effective for STD prevention. A male plastic condom is available, although its effectiveness against STDs is still being tested. Natural membrane condoms are not recommended for STD prevention.

Latex condoms should be used with a water based lubricant, since oil-based lubricants weaken the condom. Plastic condoms can be used with either kind of lubricant.




