In 1956, 20 per cent of the alumni participated in the first annual alumni fund. The first five classes which had the greatest number of participants were the class of ' 44 with 40 per cent, the class of ' 50 with 35.3 per cent, the class of ' 55 with 32.9 per cent, the class of ' 51 with 23.9 per cent and the class of ' 52 with 3.6 per cent.
