





Lauren Theresa Martin January 11, 1980 - March 27, 2004



One of the participants wrote this in a journal entry, "The hardest part about the whole trip is being home and knowing that these beautiful people are there working so hard and getting 35 cents an hour or 100-150 dolars a month as an average salary. They are trapped since this is the minimum wage and they cannot do anything about it except live their lives day by day. The most amazing thing is that they are the happiest people I have ever met in life, so content with their families and communities and love their land more than anything in the world."

The Miami trip was advised by Gail Minichielo and Dean Mark Alen. The students who participated in this trip were sophomores Melissa Beck, Orris Gorey, Audrey Simpson and Stephanie Victor, juniors Liz Beacher, Roman Hakim and Holy Subuff and senior Eric Luther. They worked with a national, non-profit organization called Little Brothers Friends of the Ederly, which is dedicated to hep aleviate bneliness among the ederly. The students worked in the senior center heping to organize the center and socialize with the seniors. They also visited homebound seniors to deliver food and visit with them. One student wrote this in a journal entry, "Even if our time with the eders is brief, I am reminded of the importance of taking time to listen. It's hard putting others first when I'm at a stage in my life where so much of my time is spent planning my future. This experience reminds me of the bigger picture to life. It's the reason for continuing my education to give me the tools that will allow me to make a difference."

We come to my world I am writing to you from my office, tucked away on the edge of the campus on the first floor of the Dorothy Dickson Darte Center at the corner of South and River Streets. While all the performing arts (as well as the campus radio station) live here, the visual arts are more dispersed throughout campus. Stark Hall contains painting, photography, soupture, and print making studios in the basement, a second floor art classroom and, of course, the magnificent Sordoni Art Galery. In addition, the display of student artwork also ties us to other areas of campus, including the third floor paintings and the multicultural mural in the Herry Student Center. Most recently, students have created a mural in the Biology department. You will also find student art work in the lower level of Farley Library. In addition, we even host events off-campus, including dances at the Jewish Community Center, dorale performances at durches on South Main Street and jazz at the Jazz Cafe.

Because so many people are unaware of our programs, I would like to provide a quick sketch of what we do and how we serve the arts we represent. The Department of the Visual and Performing Arts, the "VPA," is a community of student and faculty artists representing four disciplines: Art, Dance, Music, and Theatre. We appire to serve all students, faculty and staff of Wikes University, as well as the community at large, through exhibition, performance, discussion and research in the arts.

(Founded in 1988, it is the only accredited National Guild Community School of the Arts in the region) that the theatre program produces four main-stage productions each year?. that there is a black box theatre in the basement of the Darte providing small-scale theatrical works free and open to the public? that Wikes dance students participate in The Nutoracker and other productions of Ballet Northeast? that you are invited to paint part of our Wikes University Mule before it goes on permanent display? that the VPA presented over 40 different events this past year?

Our offerings are comprehensive. In addition to special introductory courses in each art form, we provide many other "hands-or" experiences: private lessons in all orchestral instruments, as well as guitar, piano, and voice; studio work in drawing, painting, scupture, ceramics, digital processing, and traditional photography: acting, set design/construction; dance classes in ballet, modern, jazz, and tap: training in dance choreography: Civic Band and Civic Orchestra (through Wyoming Seminary), Concert and Chamber Choirs, Jazz ensembles, chamber ensembles, pit orchestra and solo performance.



The list goes on and on when you also consider technical studies to develop graft, theoretical studies that explore structures, systems, and other perceptual patterns, and historical studies that put everything into a context of time and place. All are offered in each of the four disciplines.



For those students who have the appropriate level of talent, passion, and commitment, we provide professional career training through degree programs in Theatre Arts, Musical Theatre, Music Education, and Music Performance. The Colonels started their season with a BANG. They ended the season with a record of 8-2 overall and 7-2 in conference, while breaking some records along the way.

They started by winning their opening Middle Atlantic conference game against Albright University, 55-28. Brett Trichilo rushed for a total of 31 times to get a total of 301 yards and four touchdowns. Trichilo beat his previous record of 254 yards set back in 2001 at the game against Juniata College.

Although they may have lost their second game against Lycoming, it did not stop the team for long. They came back to win against FDU-Florham and Widener. The Colonels next game was a close 22-20 game against Moravian, which Wilkes unfortunately lost. However, the team pulled together and won 59-20 over Susquehanna University the following week.


During the Susquehanna game, Trichilo exceeded the 1,000 yard mark, reaching 1,131 yards during the season and 3,108 yards for his career. This moved Trichilo up to second place on the all-time rushing list at Wilkes.

After winning against Juniata the Colonels moved to an overall record of 5-2 and 4-2 in the conference. During the game Trichilo made a new record, averaging 188 yards per game and moving his 2003 season total to 1,397 yards. Trichilo beat the previous record of 1,390 yards set by Mike Hankins back in 1997, and tied the record of single-season touchdown mark of 15 set by Mike Gundersdorf in 1996.

Duran Porrino, a sophomore quarterback has also put out an outstanding effort. During the Juniata game he completed 16-of-25 pass attempts for 213 yards. The Colonels reached a season-high of 585 yards in total offense.

Wilkes ended their season with a win over King's College, 37 -0. Running back Brett Trichilo rushed 261 yards and made four touchdowns. This made Trichilo the sixth player in the NCAA Division III history to surpass the 2,000 yard mark in a season.

History of Wilkes University

Wilkes at 71: The Origins and Growth of our University.

With the graduation of the class of 2004, Wilkes University marks the 71st anniversary since it was founded as the first independent, non-sectarian institution of higher education in Northeastern Pennsylvania. Its evolution from Bucknell University Junior College to Wilkes University has often been difficult, but no one can accuse it of having been dull.

In 1933, there was little higher education available in Northeast Pennsylvania. The state had established what were then known as "normal schools" in Bloomsburg and East Stoudsburg, but made no effort to venture into the heart of the Northern Anthracite Coal Field. The Catholic Church had established colleges in Scranton in 1888, Marywood College in 1915, and College Misericordia in 1924. However, there was still nothing available in Wilkes Barre.

There was little interest in filling the void. A proposal made about 1910 for an independent college in Scranton failed. Local leaders argued that what

Scranton needed was better vocational education, not a liberal arts college. Wilkes-Barre community leaders were equally unenthusiastic. It was not until 1933 that Bucknell University opened a branch campus in Wilkes Barre, despite the fact that a Bucknell investigator declared that "no interested citizens...and no civic clubs presented any needs whatsoever to me."

BUJC had modest beginnings. Its first campus was the rented third floor of the Wilkes-Barre Business College. The following year, it expanded to occupy the entire building.

BUJC initially had no dormitories since it was designed to serve local commuter students. Athletic facilities were provided by the Y. M. C. A. Special events were held at the Sterling Hotel, Irem Temple, and various neighborhood churches.

Eugene Farley, a Bucknell faculty member, became director of BUJC in March 1936. He would become the first President of Wilkes College in 1947 and

would continue in that office until 1970. He opened a dialogue with Wilkes-Barre's power elite and between 1937 and 1941 secured the donation of four riverfront mansions which became the new home of the college. These buildings, their garages, and other outbuildings were renovated as offices, classrooms, and laboratories. The Kirby home, now housing the English de-

> partment, would become the library, The garage behind Chase Hall would house a tiny 90-seat theater - Wilkes-Barre's answer to off-Broadway productions.

By 1940, BUJC had been accepted as a desirable addition to the city and a movement began to expand the institution into a four-year independent college. This process was delayed by World War II, although the Board of Trustees announced its intentions of creating an endowment in 1943 and finally secured a charter for Wilkes College in June 1947.

With a small endowment, Wilkes embarked on a journey in which it was in large part affected by circumstances beyond its

control, some good and some bad. The end of World War II brought a brief period of prosperity and growth as a result of students financed by the G. I. Bill of Rights. As students arrived from farther afield, the first woman's domitory was opened in 1944, and a men's dormitory and a dining hall in 1946. The first new building was a large box, located where Stark 101 and the Stark lobby are today, and opened in the Fall of 1948. This was used for large lecture session and seated over 200. It was followed in 1950 by a gymnasium. The first campus parking lot was established in 1947 on a vacant lot at Franklin and South streets where the Farley Library now stands, beginning a seemingly never-ending effort on the part of the College to produce parking slots faster than faculty, staff, and students could produce cars.

Wilkes fell on hard times in the early 1950s as the supply of veterans was depleted. Once again, the College was saved by an influx of veterans from the Korean War. Korean War. No sooner was this source exhausted than the Soviet Union came to Wilkes' rescue. The launching of the first successful orbiting satellite by the Soviets in 1957 led the U. S. government to broaden its support of higher education, particularly in science and engineering.

This new flow of financial support and the addition of maturing baby boomers in the mid- to late-sixties brought Wilkes to maturity. Its focus shifted towards the sciences with the first section of Stark Hall being opened in 1957 and a commitment made to develop graduate technical programs. The latter supported bringing a plant of R.C.A. Corporation to Wilkes-Barre. Wilkes was recognized in November 1961 on the "Today" show as a successful new urban college.

The liberal and performing arts also received their due. The Darte Center for the Performing Arts was opened in 1965 and expanded in 1969. A new library, named for President Farley, was opened in 1968. A new dining hall and a large dormitory named Pickering Hall were opened in 1966.

As the 1960s progressed, Wilkes also became known as an athletic power. The wrestling program became nationally known with a multi-year string of conference championships and one national Division III championship. In the late 1960s the football team became equally well-known with a string of 33 consecutive wins over a period of four years.

Unfortunately, hard times were coming. If the 1960s were the best of times, the 1970s proved to be the worst. The end of the baby boom meant that competition for students became more intense and enrollments dropped rapidly. The reservoir was further depleted by the growth of Luzerne County Community College which had been established in the 1960s to provide a less expensive alternative for the first two years of college. Wilkes had been established forty years previously to provide the same service and its competition with King's College had been on a level playing field. Now, for the first time, Wilkes was competing directly with a government-subsidized institution.



The dominant force in the creation of Wilkes College and its growth for nearly four decades was Eugene Farley, director of BUJC from 1936 to 1947, president of Wilkes from 1937 to 1970, and chancellor from 1970 until 1972.

The College suffered devastating losses in the Agnes Flood of June 1972, but received \$13 million from the federal government to assist in rebuilding. Unfortunately, as the decade progressed, the college was also confronted by an energy crisis, declining federal support for higher education, and inflationary pressures which increased prices at a rate greater than at any previous time in the 20th century.

The 1970s and 1980s became a time of retrenchment. Only two new buildings were built between 1972 and 1985, an addition to Stark Hall which had been commenced before the flood and which was finished in 1975 and Evans Hall, opened in 1982. Until the 1970s, much of the growth had been unplanned and acquisitions had focused on targets of opportunity,

rather than being governed by a coherent long-range acquisition plan. Many of the later buildings acquired were smaller and less distinguished than the grand mansions in which Wilkes had started and were gradually removed, a process further stimulated by the severe damage of the Agnes Flood to many of these structures.


Financial problems and fluctuating student numbers continued to cause problems through the 1990s. Attention now came to focus on the quality of campus life and diversification of programs to stimulate new programs. New constructions projects focused on these goals. A new gymnasium was opened in 1989, replacing the spartan facility which had served Wilkes for 40 years. Other athletic facilities were upgraded as well. Breiseth Hall, a new classroom and office building, was completed in 1995, and the Henry Student Center was completed, consolidating many of the student's non-academic needs in one location for the first time in Wilkes history. Much of Stark Hall was renovated to provide facilities for a new school of Pharmacy, offering Wilkes' first doctoral program.
