Academic Costume

The celebration of Commencement is surrounded by rich traditions. The established community of scholars — the Faculty — convene to recognize officially the newest group of proven scholars — the Graduates — and welcome them in fellowship. Graduates don the attire that for years has symbolized scholarly attainment.

During the Middle Ages those seeking an education traveled to European centers of learning. Centers of learning and universities were closely allied with the clerics of the time, and the scholars donned garb similar to that worn by the clergy. This evolved into the academic uniform, a long black gown, hood, and cap, which proved useful for studying in unheated and drafty buildings. The hood served simultaneously as a head covering, a repository for coins and alms and the forerunner of the modern day book bag. The hood was adorned with the colors of the university and designated the young scholar's school or university affiliation. By their distinctive clothing the students were set apart and distinguished from the citizens of the town; hence the origin of the phrase "town and gown."

American colleges and universities adopted the wearing of the traditional apparel in Colonial times, and a common code for academic apparel was established in the mid-nineteenth century.

The hood is the most distinctive feature of academic regalia. The inside of the hood is lined with the official colors of the institution; today you see Wilkes graduates wearing hoods lined with the blue and gold colors of the University. The velvet trim around the outside of the hood designates the degree or field of study of the graduates. The velvet colors worn by today's graduates signify the following:

Golden Yellow — Science

White — Arts, Letters, Humanities

Drab — Business Administration or

Health Administration

Pink — Music

Brown — Fine Arts

Olive — Pharmacy

The style of the gown distinguishes graduates by the degree they have earned. Those earning the bachelor's degree wear a simple black gown with elongated pointed sleeves. Holders of the master's degree wear gowns with a longer, closed, square cut sleeve. The doctoral gown is trimmed with velvet stripes on the sleeves and panels of velvet on the front closure of the gown.

Some American universities have adopted doctoral gowns in their distinctive colors. You will notice the slate of Columbia, the red of Cornell, the burgundy of the University of Pennsylvania, the bright blue of the University of Michigan.

To have earned the privilege of wearing academic costume regalia signifies not only the completion of a program of studies, but entrance into the comradery of scholarship.

HONORARY DEGREES

DOCTOR OF HUMANE LETTERSWARREN D. EVANS

Born and reared in Ebensburg, Pennsylvania just over three score and ten years ago, graduate of Indiana State Teachers College, veteran of the Korean War, earning a Master's degree from Towson State College while teaching and, in 1963, a Ph.D. in Higher Education from the Pennsylvania State University, Dr. Warren Evans began his commitment to high quality education for students by teaching at Washington and Jefferson College. After four years, in 1968, he began a career lasting to the present with the Pennsylvania Department of Education where he has been an upholder of standards in overseeing the processes for approving new collegiate institutions and new academic programs, both undergraduate and graduate. As Director of Collegiate Approvals and Research Unit Liaison to Postsecondary Institutions and as a Chartering-Governance-Accreditation Specialist, he has helped fourteen colleges achieve university status (including Wilkes), eighteen to reach four-year college status, six to become two-year junior colleges, eight to become seminaries, thirty-five to secure graduate and professional status (including the new Nesbitt School of Pharmacy at Wilkes), three branch campuses and twenty-five out-of-state institutions to achieve permission to operate in the Commonwealth. Architect of much of the state policy on higher education over three decades and watchdog to protect the citizens of Pennsylvania from degree mill institutions, Dr. Evans perhaps has done more than any other individual during these years to assure the quality of the education offered to Pennsylvania students in its accredited colleges, universities and professional schools.

Native of Hazleton, growing up close to his cousin, Wilkes University's own Dr. Joseph Bellucci, earning a bachelor's and master's degree in Pharmacy from Temple University and a Ph.D in Pharmaceutics from Purdue University, Dr. James Doluisio became a national leader in Pharmacy education. First as a faculty member at the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science from 1961 to 1967, then as a professor and assistant dean at the university of Kentucky's College of Pharmacy (1967-1973), finally as Dean of Pharmacy at the University of Texas in Austin for twenty-five years, from 1973 to 1998, Dr. Doluisio helped Pharmacy become the highly respected profession it is today. By his early enthusiasm and generous assistance in guiding Drs. Nejib, Rozelle, Lennon and Bellucci in planning a School of Pharmacy at Wilkes University, he can be regarded as the godfather or grandfather of the Nesbitt School of Pharmacy. He has presided over the American Pharmaceutical Association (1982), the American Association of Pharmaceutical Scientists (1988), and the Council of Deans of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (1975). He has lectured at more than two-thirds of all the schools of Pharmacy in America and received recognition both in Texas and nationally for the leadership he has provided to his profession. Known for a style of administration that delegates authority to others and through encouragement and by example gets more out of them than they think themselves capable of accomplishing, Dr. Doluisio has been a genuine leader. Now as Hoechst-Roussel Professor of Pharmacy at the University of Texas, he continues to teach, do research, and make golf clubs and grandfather clocks.

The University Mace and Presidential Chain of Office

The mace and the presidential chain of office used in academic celebrations represent traditions dating to the sixteenth century. The mace symbolizes the authority of the university and the chain of office designates the presidential leadership of the academy.

The Wilkes University mace and presidential chain of office were gifts of local donors and were first used in 1970 at the inauguration of the second president of Wilkes. They were designed by Ottie Hill Chwalek '61 and executed by Kurt Matzdorf, a nationally recognized gold and silversmith from the State University of New York at New Paltz, New Paltz, New York.

The University Mace

The sterling silver mace has a gilt knob at its base and a gilt circle at the top bearing the inscription "Wilkes College 1933." The bowl, rising above the neck of the mace, signifies Wilkes-Barre's role as a melting pot, forming a new and vigorous community of people from many different backgrounds. This theme is reiterated in the inscription of the University's motto "Unity Amidst Diversity" which surrounds the upper part of the bowl. The gilt flame symbolizes the enlightenment gained from higher education, while the piece of anthracite coal set in the center of the flame commemorates the origin of the University in a community known for its coal mining past.

The Presidential Chain of Office

The Presidential Chain of Office, created from sterling silver, has alternating bowls and gilt flames, repeating the motif of the mace. On the front of the four-foot chain hangs a gilt seal of Wilkes which is suspended from a cluster of oak leaves with acorns, suggesting the strength and sturdiness of future generations. On the back of the Presidential Chain of Office is a silver portrait of Dr. Eugene S. Farley, the first President of Wilkes. Dr. Farley's portrait is surrounded by gilt oak leaves commemorating his strong leadership of the emerging institution.

FENNER QUADRANGLE

- BEVERAGES Water is available at the drinking fountains on the first floor of the building.
- TELEPHONE—Pay telephones are available on the lower level and the second floor.
- Local police will divert traffic from the front of the Marts Center following the ceremony. Please cooperate with the police officers and follow their directions as they attempt to alleviate traffic congestion.

A post-commencement reception will be held at the Student Union immediately following the ceremony.
