


Prepared and unprepared, serious and alert:


All who enter

ALMA MATER


Wilkes our Alma Mater,

DR. CHRISTOPHER N. BREISETH

Dr. Christopher N. Breiseth, President of Wilkes University, received his baccalaureate in History, with highest honors, in 1958 from the University of California at Los Angeles where he was a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He received the B.Litt in Modern British History from Oxford University in 1962 and the Ph.D. in Modern European Intellectual History from Cornell University in 1964.

He joined the faculty at Williams College in 1963 and was the Liaison Officer for Fulbright, Marshall and Rhodes Scholarships. In 1967, on leave from Williams College, Dr. Breiseth served for two years in the Office of Economic Opportunity in Washington, D.C., as Chief of the Policy Guidance Branch of the Community Action Program. In 1970 and 1971, he was a post-doctoral Danforth Fellow in Black Studies at the University of Chicago.

Dr. Breiseth joined the History faculty at Sangamon State University, Springfield, Illinois, where he chaired the History program and was elected the first chairman of the

Faculty Senate.

In 1980 Dr. Breiseth accepted the Presidency of Deep Springs College in California and served for three years as its President and Dean before returning to Sangamon State University where he taught until his appointment as President of Wilkes College.

During his tenure at Wilkes, Dr. Breiseth has had an enormous impact on both the college and the community. He is an integral part of the community and a constant advocate for the strong alliance that exists between the two.

He has been a leader in civic organizations and within the business community to foster development and economic growth in Northeastern Pennsylvania. Dr. Breiseth has also been instrumental in developing ways in which educational institutions in Wyoming Valley can work together to pool resources for the benefit of all students. His leadership is credited with the achievement that moved Wilkes to University status.

DR. SHELDON HACKNEY

Dr. Sheldon Hackney, President of the University of Pennsylvania, took office in 1981 after serving as president of Tulane University and as provost of Princeton University.

Dr. Hackney received his B.A. from Vanderbilt University in 1955. He served in the U.S. Navy from 1956-61, and went on to earn his M.A. and Ph.D. from Yale University in 1963 and 1966, respectively.

A historian of the American South. He is the author of the award winning Populism to Progressivism in Alabama, and Populism: The Critical Issues.

Dr. Hackney has served on the Rockefeller Commission on the Humanities and the ACE Commission on Women in Higher Education. In 1982-83 he chaired the board of directors of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, and in 1987-88 he chaired the Consortium on Financing Higher Education. He was elected to the American Philosophical Society in 1988.

Through his chairmanship of the West Philadelphia Partnership, Dr. Hackney has directed the growth of a working partnership between Penn, neighboring institutions and the residents and business people of West Philadelphia. The focus has been on community development, health care, job training, and improving the quality of public schools. Dr. Hackney has served as a member of the board of directors of the Greater Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, the Committee to Support Philadelphia Public Schools, the Urban Affairs Partnership and the University City Science Center.

Dr. Hackney has received honorary degrees from the Philadelphia College of Textiles and Science, Haverford College, the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, and the University of Edinburgh.
