### **Academic Costume**

The celebration of Commencement is surrounded by rich traditions. The established community of scholars — the Faculty — convene to recognize officially the newest group of proven scholars — the Graduates — and welcome them in fellowship. Graduates don the attire that for years has symbolized scholarly attainment.

During the Middle Ages those seeking an education traveled to European centers of learning. Centers of learning and universities were closely allied with the clerics of the time, and the scholars donned garb similar to that worn by the clergy. This evolved into the academic uniform, a long black gown, hood, and cap, which proved useful for studying in unheated and drafty buildings. The hood served simultaneously as a head covering, a repository for coins and alms and the forerunner of the modern day book bag. The hood was adorned with the colors of the university and designated the young scholar's school or university affiliation. By their distinctive clothing the students were set apart and distinguished from the citizens of the town; hence the origin of the phrase "town and gown."

American colleges and universities adopted the wearing of the traditional apparel in Colonial times, and a common code for academic apparel was established in the midnineteenth century.

The hood is the most distinctive feature of academic regalia. The inside of the hood is lined with the official colors of the institution; today you see Wilkes graduates wearing hoods lined with the blue and gold colors of the University. The velvet trim around the outside of the hood designates the degree or field of study of the graduates. The velvet colors worn by today's graduates signify the following:

Golden Yellow — Science

White — Arts, Letters, Humanities

*Drab* — Business Administration or

Health Administration

Pink — Music

Brown — Fine Arts

Olive — Pharmacy

The style of the gown distinguishes graduates by the degree they have earned. Those earning the bachelor's degree wear a simple black gown with elongated pointed sleeves. Holders of the master's degree wear gowns with a longer, closed, square cut sleeve. The doctoral gown is trimmed with velvet stripes on the sleeves and panels of velvet on the front closure of the gown.

Some American universities have adopted doctoral gowns in their distinctive colors. You will notice the slate of Columbia, the red of Cornell, the burgundy of the University of Pennsylvania, the bright blue of the University of Michigan.

To have earned the privilege of wearing academic costume regalia signifies not only the completion of a program of studies, but entrance into the comradery of scholarship.

### **HONORARY DEGREE**

DOCTOR OF LAWS ...... Louis H. Pollak

A renowned educator, scholar and jurist, you have dedicated much of your life in distinguished service to advance the cause of civil rights in this country. A graduate of Harvard College and the Yale Law School, you served as law clerk for Supreme Court Justice Wiley Rutledge; worked as associate counsel for Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton and Garrison, at the time the only interfaith, interracial Wall Street law firm; provided counsel for the Amalgamated Clothing Workers Union; served as an attorney for the United States Department of State and special assistant to Ambassador-at-large, Phillip Jessup; at both Yale and the University of Pennsylvania you were appointed Professor and Dean of their prestigious law schools; and now sit as Judge for the United States District Court for the Eastern District of PA, appointed by President Carter in 1978.

A council member for the American Law Institute since 1978 and vice president of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund for seven years, you have written scores of respected legal articles and a two-volume history of the Constitution and the Supreme Court.

Having argued cases before the United States Supreme Court and authored or shared authorship in numerous briefs for cases argued before the Supreme Court, you have had a unique opportunity to contribute to the development and reform of the law in the United States.

A recent Philadelphia Magazine cover story named you one of the 76 smartest Philadelphians. A prominent litigator quoted in the article described you as, "The sweetest, most scholarly and intellectual judge on the Pennsylvania bench — state, federal, trial or appeal."

Devoted husband to your lovely wife Katherine, this July you will celebrate 50 years of marriage. Father of five daughters and grandfather of eight, you have lived your extraor-

dinary life always with a family-first philosophy.

In the last 50 years of our country's history, few have been eyewitness to civil rights reform with the same vantage point as yours. As a member of Thurgood Marshall's inner circle, you were an architect of the strategy and shared in writing the brief, for the argument of Brown v. Board of Education before the United States Supreme Court in 1954. The case launched the modern civil rights movement and led to other court decisions that struck down all forms of legalized racial discrimination. Your commitment to civil rights and liberties took you again and again to the battlegrounds of unrest in the 1960's. You were there for the Birmingham Boycott in 1963 to help mediate a settlement, and in Montgomery to intervene with the Justice Department on behalf of the Freedom Riders.

Public service takes many shapes and forms in our country and occurs at every level of our society, from grassroots activities to the senior levels of our national government. Although the level and scope of activity may differ, what is common among those most successful is that they place the interests of others ahead of their own. In this respect, you have been exemplar. You have dedicated your life to improve the human condition and refute injustice. Your faith in the power of human beings to surmount prejudice and oppression and live by the rule of law has made you a champion of justice. As a jurist you have demonstrated compassion, a depth and breadth of scholarship, keen powers of analysis, a lofty moral tone, and integrity. You enjoy the highest esteem and respect of your judicial colleagues and of the legal profession. Your entire life you have recognized the promise of democracy and been an example of humanity to which all of us should be beckoned.

It is with distinct pleasure that I, by the authority vested in me by the Board of Trustees of Wilkes University and by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, confer upon you, Louis H. Pollak, the degree, Doctor of Laws, honoris causa, with all the rights and privileges appertaining thereto.

### The University Mace and Presidential Chain of Office

The mace and the presidential chain of office used in academic celebrations represent traditions dating to the sixteenth century. The mace symbolizes the authority of the university and the chain of office designates the presidential leadership of the academy.

The Wilkes University mace and presidential chain of office were gifts of local donors and were first used in 1970 at the inauguration of the second president of Wilkes. They were designed by Ottie Hill Chwalek '61 and executed by Kurt Matzdorf, a nationally recognized gold and silversmith from the State University of New York at New Paltz, New Paltz, New York.

#### The University Mace

The sterling silver mace has a gilt knob at its base and a gilt circle at the top bearing the inscription "Wilkes College 1933." The bowl, rising above the neck of the mace, signifies Wilkes-Barre's role as a melting pot, forming a new and vigorous community of people from many different backgrounds. This theme is reiterated in the inscription of the University's motto "Unity Amidst Diversity" which surrounds the upper part of the bowl. The gilt flame symbolizes the enlightenment gained from higher education, while the piece of anthracite coal set in the center of the flame commemorates the origin of the University in a community known for its coal mining past.

### The Presidential Chain of Office

The Presidential Chain of Office, created from sterling silver, has alternating bowls and gilt flames, repeating the motif of the mace. On the front of the four-foot chain hangs a gilt seal of Wilkes which is suspended from a cluster of oak leaves with acorns, suggesting the strength and sturdiness of future generations. On the back of the Presidential Chain of Office is a silver portrait of Dr. Eugene S. Farley, the first President of Wilkes. Dr. Farley's portrait is surrounded by gilt oak leaves commemorating his strong leadership of the emerging institution.

### FENNER QUADRANGLE
