Constitution And Laws Govern Clubs

Student - Faculty Congress Draws Up Regulations For Students

For the information of the new stu-dents of the freshman class, the Bison Stampede publishes here in full the text of the constitution drawn up last year by the Student-Faculty Council. The constitution and by-laws printed below govern all student organizations and activities of the Junior College. All students are urged to read them carefully.

carefully. Constitution and By-Laws

The Student-Faculty Council The Sindent-Faculty Council of Bucknell University Junior College. Name: The name of this organiza-tion shall be the Student-Faculty Council of Bucknell University Junior College. Membership: The members of the Security Computing on Student

Council shall consist of the members of the Faculty Committee on Student Activities, the president of the sopho-more class, the president of the fresh-man class, three sophomores who do not hold elective class offices, two freshmen who do not hold elective class offices, one man student elected by the men of the college, one woman student elected by the women students of the college. These members shall be elected within thirty days after the opening of the college in September. Other members may be added by a two-thirds vote of the council. Council Officers

two-thirds vote of the council. Council Officers Officers: The officers of the council shall consist of a president, a vice-president, and a secretary-treasurer. These officers shall be elected by the council. It shall be the duty of the president to preside at all meetings and to perform the duties which usu-ally pertain to that office. It shall be the duty of the vice-president to assist the president and to preside at meet-ings during the absence of the presi-dent. It shall be the duty of the sec-retary to keep an accurate record of retary to keep an accurate record of the proceedings of all meetings of the council and to perform such duties as usually pertain to that office.

Rainey has considered the opportunity for useful work in the direction of a national youth aid pro-gram ample enough to justify resign-ing the presidency of Bucknell Univer-sity and to devote his entire time to the task. He was 35 when he came to Bucknell after four years as head of Franklin College, In-diana. During Dr. Rainey's stay at Bucknell many improvements have been made and many more have been planned. Dr. Rainey leaves the Univer-sity at a time when its freshman class sity at a time when its freshman class has the largest enrollment it has had in many years. It was under his su-pervision the Bucknell University Junior College was brought into existence The program which Dr. Rainey has di-rected has been one of constant expansion.

Powers: The council shall have genral supervision of the student budget. of social activities, and of such other extra curricular activities which are of Anendments: The constitution may be amended by a two-third vote of the

council members present, provided that each member has been given at least one week's notice of the proposed amendment. By-Laws

1. Every student club or organiza-tion shall have a faculty adviser.

2. The register of the college shall be the treasurer of the student budget. and shall keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditures, and shall receipts and expenditures, and shall publish a financial report at the end of the college year.

3. The student budget account shall be audited by a committee consisting of a student selected by the council and a member of the faculty selected by the director of the college.

6. No organization shall disburse money without the consent of the fa-culty adviser and of a student officer of the organization.

7. No money shall be disbursed from the contingent fund without the con-sent of the student-faculty council and

sent of the student-faculty council and the director of the college. 8. The student body shall have the right to petition is signed by at least one-fourth of the student body. 9. The eligibility and classification of students shall be determined by the catalogue list.

catalogue inst. 10. Meetings of the student body shall be called by the president of the council or by a person appointed by the director of the college.

11. The secretary of the student-faculty council shall keep a record of the proceedings of meetings of the student body as a part of the permanent re-cord of the council.

12. The records of 'the meetings of the student-faculty council and of the student body shall be submitted by the secretary of the council to the director of the college for approval.

 a. Sophomore Class: The Sophomore class shall meet under the direction of its faculty adviser within two weeks after the opening of college and elect the necessary class officers.
 b. Freshman Class: The freshman class shall meet under the direction of the chairman of the Faculty Committee on Student Activities within thirty days after the

culty Committee on Student Acti-vities within thirty days after the opening of college and organize and elect the necessary officers. c. Athletics: The director of the college shall appoint a supervisor of athletics, who shall have general supervision of athletics. d. Dramatics: The director of

d. Dramatics: The director of the college shall appoint a super-visor of dramatics who shall have general supervision of dramatics.

e. Student Publications: The director of the college shall appoint a member of the faculty who shall have general supervision of stuent publications. f. Debating: The director of the

college shall appoint a member of the faculty who shall have general supervision of debating. g. Glee Club: The director of the

college college shall appoint a member of the faculty who shall have gen-eral supervision of the glee club. h. Artists' Course: The Artists'

Course Committee shall consist of the director of the college, two members of the faculty appointed members of the factity appointed by the director, and two members of the council appointed by the president of the Student-Faculty Council, This committee shall have power to arrange the Artists' Course, subject to the approval of the student- Faculty Council. Note:. The Constitution shall be

Note: The Constitution shall be considered adopted, when it has been passed by a majority of the total membership of the council and approved by the director of the college.

The Bucknell University Junior College at Wilkes-Barre is a branch of Bucknell University. The admission requirements at the Junior College are the same as the admission requirements at Lewisburg. Credits earned at the Junior College are Bucknell University credits; they will be accepted wherever Bucknell University is recognized.

Bucknell University has widened its campus to include the Wyoming Valley. Two full years of college work may be taken at the Junior College. The courses offered to freshmen and sophomores at Lewisburg are duplicated at Wilkes-Barre. The University has equipped expensive, modern laboratories at the Junior College in order that satisfactory courses in science may be given. No other institution offers such facilities in Wilkes-Barre. The Junior College is rapidly building up a library of its own under the direction of a professionally trained librarian.

Bucknell University also offers a wide variety of late afternoon and evening courses at the Junior College Building in Wilkes-Barre. Such courses are offered for both graduate and undergraduate credit.

The Bucknell University Junior College has an exceptional faculty. Every member of the staff has had graduate training; several have received doctors' degrees from the leading universities of America. The faculty includes men who have come from the graduate schools of Harvard, Yale, Columbia, Chicago, Cornell, Stanford, Duke, Virginia, and Michigan.
